
CPUC: Oversight of Electric Utility Wildfire Preparedness and Response

Elements of Risk Mitigation

- 1. Wildfire Mitigation Plans IOUs demonstrate how they are constructing, maintaining, and operating electrical lines and equipment in a manner that will minimize the risk of catastrophic wildfire. Monitored in coordination with the Office of Energy & Infrastructure Safety (OEIS). (Pub. Util. Code § 8385-8389)
- Safely Executing Public Safety Power Shutoffs Requirements for safely, temporarily turning off power to specific areas as a measure of last resort to mitigate wildfire risk. (e.g., Pub. Util. Code § 451)
- 3. Wildfire Investigation and Enforcement Investigate whether utilities have violated CPUC-jurisdictional rules and take appropriate enforcement action. (e.g., Pub. Util. Code 451)



Public Safety Power Shutoffs

During weather conditions that increase the risk of utility-caused wildfires, IOUs can make operational decisions to safely execute a **Public Safety Power Shutoff** (PSPS). The CPUC monitors utilities' PSPS preparedness and operations. CPUC roles:

- **PSPS Incident Monitoring** Required to provide reports to the CPUC during the PSPS event and after a PSPS event.
- Planning Maintain a PSPS plan developed in coordination with local, state, and community-based organizations that outlines communication and support to affected customers.
- Access and Functional Needs Planning Maintain an Access and Functional Needs (AFN) plan and work with state leadership and local, state, and community-based organizations to develop and enhance operations and resources.



Compliance Monitoring: Public Safety Power Shutoffs

- PSPS Incident Monitoring IOUs must provide reports to the CPUC during and after the PSPS event.
 - CPUC staff conducts real time compliance monitoring of IOUs' PSPS activities in relation to CPUC PSPS Guidelines and Requirements
 - Daily contact/communications with IOUs
 - Participates in daily State Executive Briefings led by Cal OES
 - Observes IOUs' internal staff meetings/Visit electric utility emergency operations centers

Investigations and Enforcement: PSPS Execution

CPUC oversight of PSPS protocols and events:

- IOUs must file Post-Event, Quarterly, and Annual Reports related to PSPS events and preparedness activities to meet PSPS regulatory requirements.
- All PSPS events are reviewed and investigated by the CPUC's Safety and Enforcement Division.
- The CPUC exercises authority to fine IOUs for violation of PSPS requirements. Recent fines include:
 - \$106 million for violations during 2019 PSPS events
 - \$19 million for violations during 2020 PSPS events
 - \$4.1 million for violations during 2021 PSPS events
 - Fines are paid by shareholders, including for shareholder-funded safety initiatives
- In 2023, the CPUC established a complementary PSPS citation program that allows the CPUC to swiftly enforce lower-level PSPS violations to diminish systemic violations by electric utilities.
