

MICHAEL J. STRUMWASSER is a founding partner of Strumwasser & Woocher, a law firm that specializes in representing public agencies and officials, public-interest groups, and labor unions. (One of the firm's clients is the California Legislature, which Strumwasser & Woocher has represented in constitutional, government law, and election law matters.)

Mr. Strumwasser has spent much of his 42 years as a lawyer representing, advising, and appearing before a wide range of administrative agencies, including the CPUC, before which he has represented the Attorney General, TURN, the Los Angeles Unified School District, and a large agricultural customer. He helped set up the Energy Commission in 1974, and as counsel to the California Insurance Commissioner he developed ratesetting regulations to implement Proposition 103 and successfully defended the program against numerous industry challenges. He has also has prosecuted unfair practices on behalf of the California Department of Insurance.

Mr. Strumwasser is a nationally recognized authority on administrative law and is co-author of the Rutter Guide, *California Administrative Law*. His practice consists of representing and advising public officials and agencies, and he also represents public-interest groups challenging governmental actions.

Mr. Strumwasser co-founded Strumwasser & Woocher after seventeen years with the California Department of Justice, the last eight years as Special Assistant Attorney General, where he handled some of the state's most important antitrust, consumer-protection, and environmental cases, including California's challenges to major supermarket and oil-company mergers, defended consumer interests in utility-rate litigation, and represented the Governor of California in Nuclear Regulatory Commission health-and-safety reviews.

Mr. Strumwasser has written and lectured widely on administrative law and economic regulation. He holds A.B., M.S., and J.D. degrees from UCLA.
